with their Grandparents. Please, please grandparents, control your grandchildren and avoid causing discomfort to some of your fellow Seniors.



Last summer one of my nieces and her brother took a trip to Poland to look up their roots. They went to the Baptist church in Ortelsburg where their dad sang and directed the choir, but the minister couldn't find their name.. Seems as though when people move in this country, they change their name. In doing all this searching he noticed on my niece's papers the name of "GROSS", my maiden name. His eyes lit up and he said this was the church Gottlieb Gross had a big part in starting the congregation. He took my niece and nephew to his house for a meal and visit and said, "Now my prayers have been answered." He prayed he would someday meet some descendant of that great missionary. So it was my grandfather that was in the highlight of their trip to Poland. It's a Small World after all.!

Someday, we will all meet and connect with our loved ones and we will understand those things that are a mystery to us Now. And have will have a reunion with our Grandparents.

approximately 10 miles from the Yucaipa SDA church. On Sabbath morning she's up at 6 a.m. to catch the bus on Redlands Blvd. near Anderson St. in Loma Linda. To allow herself a few more winks of sleep she packs a little sack lunch the night before and has her breakfast on the bus. This bus takes her all the way to Yucaipa Blvd and 5th St. where she transfers to another bus that takes her to California St. near the Sales Drug Store. From there she uses her walker to take her to church on Ave. E and Adams St. She wants to get to church by 9:15 A.M for Sabbath School starts at 9:30 A.m. Joyce is not a young person and along with aging difficulties has experienced trials that no one escapes. In a prior testimony she has written she states "Through out my life I have had difficulty in many circumstances and when I prayed and studied the Bible, I have received help to face these circumstances. Quote, Joyce "in Hebrews 13:17 we are told to serve God with joy and not with grief." Joyce is a strong believer in Prayer. Quote," we are to pray with joy, Phil. 1:4 when we pass through difficult times."

Having been raised in a Christian home from Cradle Roll age she was taught the Bible. She realizes she owes her parents the love and respect because they trained her to live for Christ. She loves to help people and loves to go to church.

My Journey

I am going to tell you about a journey that is still in progress. You will hear a lot of pronouns--ME, MYSELF, and I On March 18, 1928 I was born in Middletown,

Conn. to Dorothy Marietta Holmes and Charles Gilbert Brainard, Jr. But Dorothy was alone, because she had an absentee husband who was a Charming Charlie who popped in to see her from time to time. I had a two year old brother, who was being raised by his father's parents. Because charming Charlie usually showed up at night when he couldn't be caught by his creditors, my mother had to live with her mother who had dumped her husband because he called him a wimp! Mother was not recovering well from my birth. So Grandma said, "Dorothy you will have to turn this baby over to the state to care for it". As it turned out mother herself came down tuberculosis and was in a sanitarium for two years or so. Fifty years later when we established sensitive а friendship she told me when she signed me to over the state she turned her face to the wall and cried for three days and never shed another tear the rest of her life.

In my 1st foster home it was found the lady was feeding us babies a drug called peregoric to keep us from bothering her. The 2nd home was good (I was told), but that poor lady also came down with tuberculosis. Home # 3 with a middle-aged couple who already had 3 children in their late teens. That was not a happy place

for me as I was bossed around, ridiculed and was often denied certain foods because they could not afford to feed it to welfare children. I remained in that home for seven years.

There was a lady who took my great grandmother to church on Saturday. The lady would tell Great Grandma that she wanted to adopt a little girl. Great Grandma was getting on in age and thought I was 3 years old just the age the lady wanted.

My case worker took me to see the lady who let the case worker know she had no interest in a 9 year old. She wanted a little girl to bring up to fit into their closely knit Swedish lifestyle. She was finally persuaded to keep me overnight and that night knowing I was where I was not wanted I had a terrible nightmare. My screaming and hollering made them realize I needed them and they decided to keep me. I had a very hard time learning to call them Mom and Daddy because I had never had that experienced. We lived harmoniously, but there was one flaw. I was very rebellious. I had the privilege of church school from 4th grade, but continued my rebellious attitude. I was baptized when I was 14 mostly because my 2 classmates were going to be baptized. I went to academy but my rebellion and naughtiness continued until the school authorities insisted I leave school. I remained at home for the next vear and worked as a file clerk in an insurance At that time Hartford, Conn. was considered the insurance capital of the United States.

It was at that time I began to feel that something was missing in my life and I couldn't put my finger on it. I applied and was accepted back in school on probation for one semester. I became one their best little students, never looked at a boy and tended meticously to my studies and work program. That was very good until springtime and many of the soldiers were returning from the war. They were interested in girls and because one of them looked petite and was a blonde it seemed I was chosen. We were married 2 weeks after I graduated from academy. I suppose because he'd heard of my past, we immediately went to New Hampshire and we lived in 2 rooms above his parents apartment. He probably thought I'd not get into any mischief there.

When school opened again in the fall we drove 100 miles round trip each day to attend college. But after 1st semester I could no longer make the trip due to morning sickness. He worked for his father to pay our rent and took full class and drove 100 mi loads for 2 1/2 years until he graduated from college with his ministerial degree. When I had first met him I knew India was someday to be in my life. He served in India during the war and his heart was to lead him back. With so many G.I's returning to college, when they graduated there was not enough jobs to go around, so he opted to stay on the farm to help his Dad. That gave me a lot of time to probe into my heart about this little mingling persistence that I couldn't solve.

After 25 years and 6 days of marriage it hit me like a bombshell. That night my husband was murdered by intruders. It hit me then. I'm 44 years old and a widow. My anchor is gone and I must carry on alone, see that my children finished their education, finish my own that I left 25 years before to be a wife and mother. Then I knew the missing link--it was FAITH. That's when I knew everything was going to be o.k. with me.

I finished the degree at Andrews I had started 25 years before at Atlantic Union College. I became secretary to the Treasurer of the Southern Asia Division and worked at the General Conference in Washington, D.C., however, I was very lonely there separated from my children. I lost that wonderful Faith I was experiencing and even tried "over the counter" sleeping pills to kill myself. I wanted to die, but I was a big coward and afraid to die.

While I was working at the General Conference one day it was announced over the loud speaker that Ruth Brown had died. 75% of her body being burned as a result of their water heater explosion. I was lonely, Ken was lonely, me in Washington, D.C. and he in Pakistan. Dear friends connived to get us together and we had 33 wonderful years together. We were privileged to serve at the G.I. center in Korea, he as the civilian chaplain and I as the "hostess with the mostest". I would feed good home cooked meals to the boys, any where from 20-40 per weekend. Later we

went back to Seoul and taught English in the Language Schools. We went back to Bangledesh to teach for a semester, then to my old stomping grounds in Pakistan to help out there when they were short of teachers. Following that Ken was part time pastor in both Nebraska and Kansas.

About this time our children said, "Enough Now". So we chose a spot in Washington State and our son-in-law and his father built my dream house. But the Browns all had itchy feet so we sold our home and came to California and located in Yucaipa to be near Ken's unmarried daughter, a CPR in Loma Linda.

Ken passed away in 2007 with Alzeimer disease and I chose to remain here because I love this church and all my wonderful friends. I love to cook & bake up cookies to share with friends and neighbors. I like to think of that as one of my ministries. So my journey continues day by day with faith to faith to more faith as He continues to lead the way before me.



SOMETHING YOU SHOULD KNOW ABOUT HEART ATTACKS

Mayo Clinic On Aspirin

Dr. Virend Somers, is a Cardiologist from the Mayo Clinic, who is lead author of the report in the July 29, 2008 issue of the Journal of the American College of Cardiology.

Most heart attacks occur in the day, generally between 6 A.M. and noon. Having one during the night, when the heart should be most at rest, means that something unusual happened. Somers and his colleagues have been working for a decade to show that sleep apnea is to blame.

- 1. If you take an aspirin or a baby aspirin once a day, take it at night. The reason: Aspirin has a 24-hour "half-life"; therefore, if most heart attacks happen in the wee hours of the morning, the Aspirin would be strongest in your system.
- FYI, Aspirin lasts a really long time in your medicine chest for years, (when it gets old, it smells like vinegar).

Please read on. Something that we can do to help ourselves - nice to know. Bayer is making a crystal aspirin to dissolve instantly on the tongue. They work much faster than the tablets.

Why keep Aspirin by your bedside? It's about Heart Attacks -

There are other symptoms of a heart attack, besides the pain on the left arm. One must also be aware of an intense pain on the chin, as well as nausea and lots of sweating; however, these symptoms may also occur less frequently. <u>Note:</u> There may be NO pain in the chest during a heart attack.

The majority of people (about 60%) who had a heart attack during their sleep did not wake up. However, if it occurs, the chest pain may wake you up from your deep sleep. If that happens, immediately dissolve two aspirins in your mouth and swallow them with a bit of water.

Afterwards:

- Call 911.
- Phone a neighbor or a family member who lives very close by.
- Say "heart attack!"
- Say that you have taken 2 Aspirins.
- Take a seat on a chair or sofa near the front door, and wait for their arrival and <u>DO_NOT_LIE</u> DOWN!

Just a reminder to all: purchase a box of baby aspirin and keep one in your car, pocketbook, wallet, and bedside, etc.
