#### **OVER 60 YEARS**

Let's suppose you spent one minute looking at every exhibit at the Los Angeles Natural History Museum. How long would

you be looking, assuming you didn't sleep day or night? For the answer see the title of this article. That's right. Over sixty years. There are thirty five million exhibits in the museum and an adventurous group of seniors decided to brave the dangers posed by the 34 feet long Tyrannosaurus Rex, the Stegosaurus, the Triceratops and their ilk. Fortunately these creatures had been dead a long time, probably not as long as was claimed, but dead enough to pose no danger. They, along with other dinosaurs, are housed in the new 14,000square-foot Dinosaur Hall. This is twice as large as the museum's old dinosaur galleries and the exhibits are superbly displayed. We encountered science not as static information but as a vibrant, ongoing investigation into mysteries- some resolved and some still being explored.

There was so much to see. You could, if you wished go on an indoor African Safari. The African Mammal Hall realistically represents creatures and habitats from an Africa that is fast disappearing. We were able to see "invisible" creatures. Some shy solitary or nocturnal creatures represented in the African Hall often elude the human eye and are rarely seen in the wild.

Are you a spider fan? There is a spectacular exhibition of free-range spiders. The world that spiders inhabit is a perilous one and they must worry constantly about being crushed or eaten!! You like bees? You will be catered for. You will learn more about the parasitic Zombie fly that turns bees into zombies. Then there are the nature gardens, every type of mammal, insect, reptile, amphibian, mineral etc. you can imagine and more.

We returned from our visit to Wonderland exhausted but thrilled with what

we had seen and looking forward to the next senior trip.

## Come Spend the Day at the Long Beach Aquarium

#### **OCTOBER 13, SUNDAY**



Two Magellanic Penguin chicks that hatched at the Aquarium of the Pacific in late June made their public debut on September 10, joining the rest of the penguins in the June Keyes

<u>Penguin Habitat</u>. The chicks, one male and one female.

The Tropical Reef Habitat, which can be viewed from three locations in the gallery, is the Aquarium's largest exhibit. Holding 350,000 gallons of water, this exhibit features over a thousand colorful fish and beautiful coral, including sea turtles, zebraand blacktip reef sharks, porcupine puffers, and a large blue Napoleon or humphead wrasse.

Experts estimate that as much as 95 percent of the volume of the World Ocean and 99 percent of its seafloor remain unexplored.

Wonders of the Deep: Humans have only just begun to scratch the surface of our planet's vast ocean. Be an explorer at the Aquarium, and learn about the history of ocean exploration, current missions, new discoveries, and challenges and opportunities for the future. New animals, exhibits, educational displays, films, an art exhibit, a festival, and an ocean explorer guest speaker series are all part of our year-long program on Ocean Exploration. The highlight is the new Wonders of the Deep exhibit that features the unusual and unique animals that live in the deep sea beyond the reach of light.

Immerse yourself in our new special exhibit, *Wonders of the Deep*. Visitors can see how mysterious sea creatures live beyond the reach of light, and discover the unusual

and intricate ecosystems that have evolved within the deep ocean.

When was the first manned submersible launched? When was the deepest place in the ocean discovered?

Learn about the history of ocean exploration with this timeline, which includes selected notable events and discoveries.

Experience new shows playing daily throughout the Aquarium. New shows include films projected in the Great Hall, on Science on a Sphere® in the Ocean Science Center, and in the Ocean Theater.

There is so much more that you will not want to miss. All the church is invited to join Seniors' Fellowship on our trip to the aquarium. Meet at the Long Beach Aquarium at 11:30 am. You are welcome to bring your sack lunch and eat outside or buy food inside. Parking is across from the museum. You must sign up in foyer or call
