Following the Rose Parade, the floral masterpieces are parked along Sierra Madre and Washington boulevards in Pasadena, allowing visitors to further appreciate the

design and workmanship that goes into their creation. Visitors are able to walk within a few feet of the floats and see for themselves the creativity and detail of the floral displays. Tournament volunteer members – "white suiters" – are on hand to answer questions

Wear comfortable walking shoes as there are no trams and seating is limited. Viewing all the floats will require walking a distance of approximately 2.5 miles and will take at least two hours. The venue is often crowded and you will be walking and viewing at a leisurely pace.

Remember to stay hydrated, particularly if the day is hot. Water is available free-ofcharge at three locations within the venue.

There are a limited number of food vendors at the venue. Visitors are welcome to bring small quantities of food and non-alcoholic drinks into the venue.

SUNDAY, FEBRUARY 23



The best time to see your favorite animals:

Visitors who come to The Living Desert in the early morning are in for some delightful surprises! In the cool of the morning, most of the animals on exhibit are at their peak activity. Playing, some eating breakfast, catching the wind for the scent of other nearby animals, stretching and prowling. As the day warms up, so do the birds of prey, fanning out their huge marvelous wings to the sun. The tortoises and lizards come out of their hiding places to feel the gentle warmth. Warthogs and javelinas rout and romp in the morning hours, contentedly grunting during nap time in the midday sun. Meerkats seem to play all afternoon, each taking a turn being the lookout, while the others scamper about. Late afternoon is the wake up call to nocturnal creatures. The cheetahs often climb to the top of their ridge and majestically watch the sun set.

Clothing:

Make sure you wear comfortable walking preferably closed Dress shoes. toe. accordingly to the season. Summer days can reach well above 100 degrees F / 37 degrees C. Even though most visitors think less clothing means cooler body temperatures, this is not true. Long sleeve 100% cotton shirts are the best to keep you cool. Allowing sweat to completely evaporate from your skin will make you hotter and dehydrate quicker. Hats, sunscreen, even an umbrella is recommended for all seasons. Winter day temperatures sometimes warrant a jacket or sweater.




The Living Desert features animals and plants that thrive in deserts

from all around the world, including all four deserts of North America. bats, scorpions, screech owls, mice, lizards and snakes are along the pathways in North America, and you will also encounter many birds of prey such as hawks, falcons, eagles and vultures. Mammals such as coyotes, badgers, wolves, mountain lions and bobcats which may be seen as you approach Eagle Canyon. Also located in North America is Bighorn Mountain with the rare desert bighorn, and nearby are the endangered Peninsular pronghorn. The botanical gardens in this area represent the great diversity of flora

found throughout the North American deserts.

Africa has some of the most dramatic deserts in the world. The



names Sahara, Sahel, Namib, Kalahari, and the Horn of Africa conjure a vision of Africa's arid lands. There are many African animals at The Living Desert such as hornbills, weaver finches, meerkats, rock hyrax, warthog, sand cat, fennec fox, giraffe and ostrich, the endangered cheetah and Cuvier's gazelle, and the rare Grevy's Zebra. ou can see some of the most endangered animals in the world. There are only a handful of slender-horned gazelles left in the Sahara, but The Living Desert has one of the best zoo-based breeding colonies in the world. Recently, addax born at the Living Desert were reintroduced to an area of Tunisia's Grand Erg at the edge of the Sahara. adding to the numbers and populations of this nearly extinct African antelope. Exotic African plants are also part of our arid African landscapes, from 30 species of acacia to bizarre kokerbooms.



A LIFE OF SERVICE

On January 25, 1914, William and Minnie Hodde, of Cincinnati Ohio, and their little two year old William welcomed their little baby girl, Alice Hodde. Two years later in 1916 her sister, Alberta, became a part of the Hodde family with little brother, Erwin, joining them in 1918.

Their mother, Minnie, was determined that her children would know about their friend, Jesus. She was very faithful in teaching them the Bible Truths and every Sunday her father, William, would get them to the streetcar which took them to the closest Evangelical church.

A surprise came into their lives in 1918 when a Literature Evangelist knocked on their door with a case full of books and her mother bought some that were written by Ellen G. White. She was so impressed that over the next few years she managed to buy a book here and there. As she read these books to her children, they were drawn to the truth and she and her children found a Seventh-day Adventist Church nearby.

As Alice walked up the church steps on Sabbath, she looked up and saw a lady who had a very kind face. Mildred Morton enthusiastically greeted Minnie and her little family. Alice remembers how kind and loving she was to the family and she instantly took a liking to this very friendly lady. She found Sabbath School to be a lot more interesting than the Sunday School she had come from. At the age of 12, Alice, her mother and the rest of the children joined the Cincinnati Seventh-day Adventist Church and she was very happy in her new found faith. She loved listening to and studying the Bible truths that she had come to love and the people were a lot friendlier than the church they had left.

In all the happiness of joining their new church, there was some sadness in that Alice's father, William, had not joined with his wife and their children. One day when Alice arrived home from school, her mother met her at the door with a big smile on her face and told Alice that her father had decided to be baptized. There was great rejoicing as the family was united in their new faith and their church.

Alice's first eight years were spent in public school. Now that her family was united as Seventhday Adventists, it was decided that she would spend her high school years attending Mt. Vernon Academy in Mt. Vernon, Ohio. Four years later she graduated and that summer she was off to Washington Missionary College in Takoma Park, Maryland.

It was that summer, while washing glasses in the college dining room, that she saw a tall young man come in and ask her roommate to go Harvest Ingathering with the Sligo Church. Her roommate politely replied that she had other plans for the evening and could not go. Alice did not know who this gentleman was but she quickly spoke up and said "I can't sing but I can solicit and I would love to go." His answer was "Oh, that is just what I am looking for." She found out that his name was Leon Robbins and that he was attending the Seventh-day Adventist Theological Seminary. From this event they started dating and their relationship started to build gradually until approximately six months later Leon gave her a Christmas gift of a beautiful little clock that had a pendulum swinging back and forth. She still has the little clock in her home.

A couple of years later, on May 20, 1934, Leon graduated from the Seminary with a M.Div. in Theology and the next day, May 21, Leon and Alice were united in marriage at a friend's home. They spent their honeymoon traveling to Dayton, Ohio where Leon had accepted a call to the Far Hills Church. Their starting salary was \$12 a week and \$2 a week for streetcar fare since they didn't own a car. Two years later their daughter, Joanne Robbins, was born. When asked if she had finished her degree Alice replied, "No, I felt it was more important for me to marry a minister than to finish my degree."

Throughout their years of pastoring they spent many of them in Ohio. From Far Hills Church in Dayton, Ohio they pastored churches in Akron and Cleveland before going on to New York City, Boston, and many more that Alice could not remember. At each church Alice would help Leon with evangelistic meetings drawing many new members into their congregations. The dates of their service is sketchy.

Alice and her husband were missionaries in in Brazil where Leon was one of the officers of the South American Division. Leon traveled all over the division, which included multiple South American Countries while Alice stayed home with their young daughter, Joanne. Following Brazil they made their home in Japan. Leon and Alice worked together in building a new church in Kobe of which he then became Pastor.

Japan was their favorite place to live. The people were so polite and wonderful to them. It was in Japan that Alice learned to bow. Something that she still does naturally, and she finds herself bowing from time to time, for example, to the girls who serve them at the table during meal times at the Villa.

After Leon and Alice retired they joined the Yucaipa Church where her husband served for many years as a Sabbath School teacher.

As the years rolled by they made a decision to move to the Linda Valley Villa in Loma Linda. She starts every morning with prayer, and many times during the day, she asks Jesus to help her be more like him and thanking her heavenly Father for giving her Jesus. She always prays before she leaves her little apartment. In reflecting on her life before and after marriage she stated, "Throughout all of my life Jesus has always been there for me."

As I was getting ready to leave her apartment, her last comment was to say that every day she tells Ronnie, an employee of the Villa, "I love this Villa and I love my church and most of all I love my Jesus."
